Do you have an interest in the education of deaf children/language and cultural diversity in the context of Roma communities in the UK? Do you want to further your career in one of the UK's leading research intensive Universities?

You will work with Professor Ruth Swanwick (PI) and Dr Jackie Salter in the School of Education and national deaf education partners on a project funded by the Leeds Social Sciences Institute to examine the educational and social needs of deaf children of Roma families.

With a successfully completed PhD (this includes work submitted for assessment, but not yet examined) in a relevant field of study, you will have research interests in deaf children's language and social development and/or the linguistic and cultural biographies of children in Roma communities and the development of appropriate multi professional support.

You will work with deaf education and related professionals and Deaf and Roma organisations to gather information from a range of sources and individuals. You will possess excellent analytical and writing skills and the ability to deal with a variety of tasks to set deadlines. The ability to work alone and as part of a team are essential, along with strong organisational and excellent communication skills.

You will also work with members of the School of Education to organise research events, assist in publishing in peer-reviewed journals and be involved in producing short reports on the research findings for various academic, professional and non-professional audiences during your time on this project.

The post will involve regular UK travel to deaf education schools and services to collect demographic and case study information, for national networking meetings and conference organisation.



What does the role entail?

As a Research Assistant your main duties will include:

- Working with and supporting Professor Ruth Swanwick on her research agenda, research projects and publications;
- Being an active researcher, conducting research, planning and undertaking fieldwork/conferences and analysing data;
- Under guidance, drafting project reports and preparing conference talks and project report contributions;
- Coordinating the academic and project partners and organising the networking and conference events;
- Developing impact and engagement activities with a wide group stakeholders;
- Being involved in presenting research findings to academic and professional audiences and communicating complex data in accessible ways;
- Assisting with developing and supporting research applications and proposals for funding in the specified research area;
- Contributing to research planning and development within the School, where appropriate;
- Balancing the competing pressures of research demands and deadlines.

These duties provide a framework for the role and should not be regarded as a definitive list. Other reasonable duties may be required consistent with the grade of the post.

What will you bring to the role?

As a Research Assistant you will have:

- A PhD (this includes work submitted for assessment, but not yet examined) in a relevant area of study such as deaf education and deaf studies, child development, language and linguistics, migration (Roma) studies or disability in the context of migration;
- Knowledge of the context of deaf education and studies and/or Roma and migration education and studies;
- Experience of successfully conducting qualitative research in educational settings and with educational professionals;
- Experience of presenting research findings to professional and/or academic audiences;



- Experience in public engagement and impact activities;
- Experience in writing project and grant applications;
- Advanced knowledge of issues of ethics in research and experience of ethics research applications;
- Excellent organisational skills with a demonstrable ability to manage time effectively, to prioritise tasks and meet internal and external deadlines;
- A high level of interpersonal and communication skills, including ability to communicate effectively with the academic lead researcher and other stakeholders as appropriate;
- Good general IT skills;
- Ability to work independently and on own initiative;
- Ability to demonstrate judgement in planning and carrying out activities.

You may also have:

- Knowledge of British and/or another Sign Language;
- Experience of research with deaf participants/communities;
- Experience of research with Roma participants/communities;
- Experience of conducting qualitative research with children and families;
- Experience in managing web content (through Wordpress-based platform) and social media communication.

About the job

You will be responsible the Dean of the Faculty and report to the Head of School (with day to day line management by the Principal Investigator and Co-Investigators).

This project builds on the established work of Professor Swanwick and colleagues and the Language Planning Tool that was developed for describing and documenting the language biographies and repertoires of multilingual deaf children.

The project will bring together academics, educational, health, charity and community partners to identify the learning, development and social needs of deaf children of Roma families, plan appropriate multi-professional intervention and support and establish a national stakeholder group to ensure the reach, development and sustainability of the outcomes.

Under the direction of the Principal Investigator you will prepare the ethical approval documentation, collate nationally available demographic data and collect case study information from Local Authorities, schools, teachers and families in the context of deaf education.

You will coordinate the project network meetings and the final national dissemination conference. You will facilitate communication across the project participants and support the development of the wider national group of stakeholders and beneficiaries. You will undertake a scoping review of the research and grey literature to inform the direction and support the development of the follow-on bid.
