Post-Doctoral Research Fellow on the ERC-funded project Group Thinking: New Foundations, School of Philosophy, Religion and History of Science, Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Cultures

Are you an outstanding researcher in philosophy or related area? Do you have a developing research record and an ability to work as part of a research team? Are you keen to work on a ground-breaking research project funded by the European Research Council?

We are looking for talented researchers to join the ERC-funded project Group Thinking: New Foundations (2019-2024), led by Prof. J. Robert G. Williams. This project explores group thought: its nature, and its significance for explanatory projects inside and outside philosophy. It seeks to reveal the underlying unity between the facts that constitute the beliefs and desires of individuals, and the facts that constitute the beliefs and desires of groups. It will provide criteria for demarcating which groups genuinely have beliefs and desires, distinguishing this situation from circumstances when attributing beliefs and desires is mere "loose talk". The aim is new and rigorous foundations for theory and for public discourse about group belief and desire.

The project draws on several fields of philosophy including:

- Philosophy of mind and language (e.g. metasemantics, metaphysics of mental content, collective intentionality, group attitudes in psychological theory).
- Metaphysics (e.g. social ontology, personal identity, group persistence).
- Formal Epistemology (e.g. representation theorems, social choice, analysis of common knowledge, judgement aggregation)
- Philosophy of action (e.g. nature and grounding of intention, collective action).
- Philosophy of normativity (e.g. nature of reasons and rationality, group reasons)
- Ethics/political philosophy (e.g. group attitudes and duties, legitimacy, complicity).

You will have a PhD (by start of post) in philosophy or an allied discipline. As one of two postdocs involved in the project, you will an integral part of a eight-member project



team, pursuing independent work related to the overall project theme. You will also work as a research assistant to the PI, and will be expected to be involved in planning and running collaborative activities of the project group, as well as undertaking administrative work associated with the project.

You will be based at the University of Leeds and will be expected to take an active role in the overall research life and culture of the department. There will be opportunity for career development by undertaking a small amount of teaching and administration roles related to project themes.

We particularly welcome applications from candidates belonging to groups that have been traditionally underrepresented in philosophy, including but not limited to women and ethnic minorities.

What does the role entail?

As a post-doctoral research fellow, your main duties will include:

- Developing and publishing research related to the project themes.
- Working as research assistant to the Principal Investigator (e.g., produce literature reviews).
- Organising project meetings, workshops and conferences in liaison with PI and postgraduate students.
- Maintaining records of project finances.
- Undertaking limited teaching in project-related areas, by negotiation.

These duties provide a framework for the role and should not be regarded as a definitive list. Other reasonable duties may be required consistent with the grade of the post.

What will you bring to the role?

You will have:

- A PhD (or very near to completion by start of post) in philosophy or allied discipline.
- A background in areas of philosophy related to the project.
- Outstanding research ability in philosophy.
- The ability to work individually and as part of a group.



- Familiarity with Microsoft Office programmes such as Word and Excel; Powerpoint; Outlook (or close equivalents); the capacity to interact with a virtual learning environment; and basic web skills.
- Strong planning and reporting skills.
- Strong interpersonal and team-working skills.
- Effective communication skills (including a high standard of written English).

It would be desirable to have:

- Expertise in social and political philosophy or philosophy of collective intentionality.
- Knowledge of relevant work in disciplines relevant to project themes, for example linguistics, cognitive science or psychology.
- Experience of publishing academic research.
- Experience of project management
- Experience of web design.
- Experience of conference/workshop organization.

4. A research proposal (maximum 1000 words) describing a programme of research complementary to the project aims.
