Research Fellow in Malnutrition, Obesity and Public Health School of Food Science and Nutrition Faculty of Environment

Are you an ambitious researcher looking for your next challenge? Do you have an established background in the area of malnutrion (under-nutrition and/or obesity) and public health, or experience of conducting health research in China? Do you want to further your career in one of the UKs leading researchintensive Universities?

The double burden of malnutrition (DBM) refers to the coexistence of undernutrition, including stunting, wasting, and underweight; with overweight and obesity in a society. The DBM, accompanied with micronutrients deficiency (MND) in childhood, is a significant risk for impaired physical and cognitive growth and development. China's fast economic development has seen increasing incidence of overweight/obese children in affluent regions which results from an imbalance of energy consumption and expenditure. In recognition of these problems, China has developed national dietary guidelines to promote healthy diets in children. Furthermore, nutritional intervention strategies have been undertaken and shown effectiveness in addressing MND and undernutrition in children. However, a major challenge is to scale-up these interventions to the whole population using a combined food system approach and this is the aim of the research for which this post is advertised.

The research will be conducted in partnership with the Nutrition and Health Institute of China Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (China CDC) and the China National Health Development Research Centre (CNHDRC). The field research programme spans a number of regions in China representing different levels of development involving a large cohort of study participants (children and their parents/carers). The research aims to assess the social economic and environmental barriers and develop novel approaches to improve the scalability of food-system based strategies (supplementation, biofortification, culturally acceptable educational materials and nutritional guidelines for schools) aimed at reducing MND associated with the DBM in China and beyond. There will also be the opportunity to be involved in experimental research within the project, assessing children's preferences and cognitive and physical functions as well as behavioural interventions to increase liking of certain foods.



With a PhD in nutrition, public health, epidemiology, psychology or a closely allied discipline, you will have a strong background in nutritional epidemiology research and/or qualitative research and statistical skills/experience. You will also have experience of conducting research with human participants and the ability to travel to and conduct field visits in China.

What does the role entail?

As a Research Fellow, your main duties will include:

- Coordinating the project on a day-to-day basis, communicating with the Principle/Co Investigators/partners to implement project planning, develop protocol and progress reporting in a timely manner;
- Summarising research data, preparing papers for publication in leading international journals and disseminating research results through other recognised forms of output;
- Evaluating research methods and techniques used and results obtained by the team to ensure the research follows good research practice as defined by the UKRI and to relate such evaluations appropriately to your own work;
- Developing research objectives and contributing to proposals for funding;
- Working independently and also as part of a larger team of researchers, engaging in knowledge-transfer activities where appropriate and feasible;
- Maintaining your own continuing professional development and acting as a mentor to less experienced colleagues as appropriate;
- Contributing to the training of both undergraduate and postgraduate students, including assisting with the supervision of projects in areas relevant to the project;
- Frequent travel to China and involvement in research field visits in China, however the post will be UK based.

These duties provide a framework for the role and should not be regarded as a definitive list. Other reasonable duties may be required consistent with the grade of the post.

What will you bring to the role?

As a Research Fellow you will have:

• A PhD in nutrition, public health, epidemiology, psychology or a closely allied discipline;



- A strong background in nutritional epidemiology research, and/or qualitative research and statistical skills/experience;
- Experience in conducting research with human participants;
- Good time management and planning skills, with the ability to meet tight deadlines, manage competing demands and work effectively under pressure without close support;
- A proven track record of peer-reviewed publications in high impact factor journals in the project relevant field;
- Excellent written and verbal communication skills including presentation skills;
- The ability to travel to, and conduct field visits in China;
- A proven ability to work well both individually and in a team;
- A strong commitment to your own continuous professional development.

You may also have:

- The ability to communicate in Chinese;
- Experience in conducting survey, qualitative or experimental research with children and young people.
