Are you an academic with a proven ability to carry out teaching and research in nutritional epidemiology or related topics? Are you passionate about delivering an exceptional student experience in a research-intensive Russell Group University? Do you have an excellent research record and proven success obtaining funding?

The School of Food Science and Nutrition is the oldest and highest ranked university department of food science in the UK. The School is continuing to invest in new academic staff, expanding its capability in nutrition and public health. The poor health of the nation, particularly in relation to obesity has been one of the factors underlying the severe impact of the pandemic in the UK. The post holder will be required to deliver inspirational teaching and supervision as well as internationally recognised research. We invite applications from outstanding academics who are able to demonstrate a track record in student education, research and academic leadership.

As a lecturer in the School of Food Science and Nutrition, you will carry out teaching and research in the field of nutrition with specific emphasis on epidemiology, and public health and data analytics. You will contribute to academic leadership and your research will focus particularly on understanding the role of food systems in contributing to more sustainable diets for better health. You will be a member of the Nutritional Sciences and Epidemiology research group, building collaborations with research groups in the school, the wider university, nationally and internationally. You will support School activity linked to the UK Women's Cohort Study and the WHO Collaborating Centre in Nutritional Epidemiology.

With a passion for undertaking research-led teaching as well as a vision and drive to develop a prestigious internationally competitive research portfolio, you will make a significant impact on the performance, stature and profile of student education and research at the University of Leeds. You will have a PhD in a relevant field, and a proven record of both research outputs and teaching in a university environment.



What does the role entail?

As a Lecturer, your main duties will include:

- Undertaking research-led teaching at different levels, including assessment and examinations and contributing towards module design, review and quality assurance mechanisms;
- Providing support, guidance and timely feedback to students, acting as a personal tutor, resolving issues and/or referring to specialist parties, where appropriate;
- Being actively involved in research, innovation and impact at a national and international level, as well as contributing to local School/Faculty activity;
- Maintaining a record of high quality publications of national and international standing;
- Attracting research funding individually and collaboratively to support high quality research activity;
- Promoting the integration of your own research area with other research interests within and outside the School and Faculty;
- Providing research supervision and helping to attract students to the University;
- Contributing effectively to the administrative processes and committee structures of the School/Faculty including taking on leadership roles and managing initiatives that facilitate School, Faculty or University performance or business.

These duties provide a framework for the role and should not be regarded as a definitive list. Other reasonable duties may be required by the Head of School/Dean of Faculty consistent with the grade of the post.

What will you bring to the role?

As a Lecturer you will have:

- A PhD in nutrition, epidemiology, public health or a closely related field
- A track record of research outputs, within the area of nutrition, in refereed publications of internationally excellent quality;
- A successful record of obtaining external research funding with the potential for obtaining further funding in the future;



- An ability to contribute to and develop interdisciplinary collaborative research projects in a broad range of areas;
- A proven record of teaching public health related nutrition in a University environment, with an enthusiastic approach to teaching, including the ability to interact with students in ways that will enhance the student experience;
- Experience of proactively developing new teaching approaches and materials in the area of nutrition;
- A high level of interpersonal and communication skills, and a strong ability to communicate effectively in writing and verbally with students, academic and external audiences;
- An ability to contribute to management and administrative processes and structures, including managing resources and/or staff.

You may also have:

- Experience of providing postgraduate student supervision;
- Experience of contributing to academic leadership.
