Would you like to help deliver the exciting work of the Yorkshire Integrated Catchment Solutions Programme (iCASP) to practitioners, academics, and policy-makers? Are you educated to PhD level in a relevant environmental science discipline such as meteorology, hydrology, environmental science or climate science?

The programme requires an Impact Translation Fellow to work at the interface between academia and stakeholder organisations, solving problems facing industry and government with catchment dynamics including issues around nature recovery, green financing, flood forecasting, flood risk, geothermal energy, agriculture, water quality and resilience to climate change.

Reporting to the Programme Directors you will have the relevant technical ability together with strong computing skills. Working with partners and the flexibility or aptitude to work on a range of projects supporting the wider team if required will also be essential.

You will be an excellent communicator, both written and verbal, with the ability to develop and maintain strong relationships within the team and with external partners. You'll achieve results by being proactive and using your initiative to help report and promote impact for the iCASP Programme Team and to secure funding for regional initiatives

What does the role entail?

Your main duties will include:

- Science translation activity and supporting how that translation is embedded within user organisations;
- Undertaking technical work including data analysis & spatial analysis;
- Producing reports, presentations, user-friendly information and tools relevant to the projects you are delivering;
- Identifying and building key relationships between partner representatives and academic staff;
- Identifying opportunities for maximising impact from the programme;
- Lead workshops and support other events;
- Representing iCASP at stakeholder events;
- Being flexible and adaptable in application of expertise;



- Reporting impact evidence, completion of the impact database and identifying opportunities to maximise impact for projects and programme;
- Providing project support to the team as required;
- Working both independently and as part of a larger team.

These duties provide a framework for the role and should not be regarded as a definitive list. Other reasonable duties may be required consistent with the grade of the post.

What will you bring to the role?

As an Impact Translation Fellow you will have:

- A PhD (or close to obtaining: i.e. the initial thesis needs to have been handed in at the point of application) in a relevant environmental science discipline (one or more of nature recovery, green financing, flood forecasting, flood risk, geothermal energy, sustainable agriculture, water quality and climate & net zero);
- A strong understanding of societal, economic or environmental impact;
- Strong data analytical and report writing skills;
- Experience of building effective working relationships with non-academic stakeholders;
- Excellent verbal communication skills, including presentations;
- Good time-management and personal organisation, evidenced ability to work to deadlines;
- Evidence of being flexible and adaptable in application of expertise and willingness to develop a wide skill set.

You may also have:

• Direct experience of working on knowledge transfer projects.
