

Overview of the Role

Do you have experience of supporting research projects? Have you excellent organisational and communications skills? Do you enjoy the challenge of coordinating both people and tasks in a complex project environment? Do you have experience of trauma-informed research? Are you bilingual in English and French?

You will join the research team on a Wellcome Trust Discovery Award project "Work-related suicide. An international social justice analysis" led by Prof Sarah Waters.

The purpose of the research project is to deepen understanding of the causes and contexts of work-related suicide across the UK, France and Canada, with the aim of influencing policy.

Your role will be to support the research team, post-doctoral researchers, other team members and stakeholders to support the delivery of the project's goals and strategy.

This position offers an exceptional opportunity to collaborate with an interdisciplinary team of experts, gain hands-on experience with cutting-edge methodologies, and contribute to impactful research that bridges academic inquiry with real-world policy.

Main duties and responsibilities

- Your role will involve managing and collating data gathered by researchers across three countries and ensuring accuracy of databases.
- Supporting research activities through organisational and administrative tasks including support with conference organisation, travel arrangements, meetings, recruitment of participants and dissemination.
- You will act as the first point of contact for enquiries from within or outside the
 organisation, communicating and liaising with project partners and
 international collaborators. You will prepare texts for interview participants in
 English and French (including texts in accessible formats, where required).



- Your role will also include budget management.
- Contributing to social media outputs include a project website, newsletters and other media platforms.

These duties provide a framework for the role and should not be regarded as a definitive list. Other reasonable duties may be required consistent with the grade of the post.

Qualifications and skills Essential

- A strong background in qualitative research methods, ideally working on sensitive or trauma-informed projects;
- Excellent interpersonal and communication skills, both written and verbal and the ability to communicate effectively with a wide range of stakeholders;
- Fluency in English and French
- Experience working with data and data organisation;
- Excellent IT skills and experience working with social media
- Excellent administrative and organisational skills

Desirable

- Experience in engaging with policymakers;
- Awareness of research and innovation within an academic environment.
- Experience working on cross-national projects
