Research Fellow in Astrophysics, School of Mathematics.

Are you interested in astrophysics, and how advanced computational methods can be used to investigate the evolution of magnetic fields in neutron stars? Would you like to feel part of a strong supportive group at the University of Leeds?

We are looking for a Research Fellow to join our Science and Technology Facilities Council (<u>STFC</u>) funded project for 36 months, which will investigate magneto-thermal evolution in magnetars. The project will involve performing numerical simulations to study magnetic fields in the cores and crusts of neutron stars, using and extending one or more existing codes, but also developing entirely new codes. The results from these calculations will be applied to interpret observations such as X-ray thermal emission, long gamma-ray bursts, superluminous supernovae, etc., and to make predictions for future observations.

You will work in close contact with Professor <u>Rainer Hollerbach</u> in the Department of Applied Mathematics, and will join the <u>Astrophysical and Geophysical Fluid Dynamics</u> research group, which is one of the largest and strongest such groups in the world. The project will also involve collaborating with Dr <u>Andrei Igoshev</u> at Newcastle University, as well as other national and international collaborators. The post is currently available for a start date as soon as possible from 1st July 2025, but later start dates can be negotiated.

You will have a PhD in Astrophysics, Applied Mathematics, or a closely related discipline, together with experience in large-scale computing. You will also have the ability to conduct independent research and a developing track record of publications in international journals. In addition, you will have excellent communication, planning and team working skills.

What does the role entail?

As a Research Fellow, your main duties will include:

- Designing, planning and conducting a programme of investigation in magnetar physics, in consultation and collaboration with Professor <u>Rainer Hollerbach</u>, Dr <u>Andrei Igoshev</u>, and other external collaborators;
- Generating and pursuing independent and original research ideas in the appropriate subject area;
- Developing research objectives and proposals and contributing to setting the direction of the research project and team, including preparing proposals for funding in collaboration with colleagues;
- Evaluating methods and techniques used and results obtained by other researchers and to relate such evaluations appropriately to your own research;
- Making a significant contribution to the dissemination of research results by publication in the leading international peer-reviewed journals and by presentation at national and international meetings;
- Working independently and as part of a larger team of researchers, both internally and externally, to develop new research links and collaborations and engage in knowledge transfer activities where appropriate;
- Maintaining your own continuing professional development and acting as a mentor to less experienced colleagues as appropriate;
- Contributing to the training of both undergraduate and postgraduate students, including assisting with the supervision of projects in areas relevant to the project.

These duties provide a framework for the role and should not be regarded as a definitive list. Other reasonable duties may be required consistent with the grade of the post.



What will you bring to the role?

As a Research Fellow you will have:

- A PhD (or have submitted your thesis before taking up the role) in Mathematics, Astrophysics, or a closely allied discipline;
- A strong background in scientific computation, particularly computational magnetohydrodynamics or fluid dynamics;
- The ability to rapidly acquire expertise in unfamiliar areas in both numerical methods and astrophysics;
- Good time management and planning skills, with the ability to meet tight deadlines and manage competing demands effectively without close support;
- A developing track record of peer-reviewed publications in international journals;
- Excellent communication skills both written and verbal, and the ability to communicate your research at national and international conferences;
- A proven ability to work well both independently and in a team;
- A strong commitment to your own continuous professional development.

You may also have:

- Experience of pursuing external funding to support research;
- Experience in programming and running simulations on parallel computers;
- Experience in simulating astrophysical or geophysical flows and/or magnetic fields in spherical geometry;
- Experience with neutron star physics.
