Are you an academic with proven abilities to carry out teaching in Ancient Greek History? Could you deliver quality teaching in the School of Languages, Cultures and Societies at Leeds?

We are looking to recruit an enthusiastic and motivated individual with expertise in Ancient Greek History at 0.5 FTE for a period of 12 months. You will have experience teaching Ancient History at university level. You will contribute to teaching-related activity at local School level and to the effective management of our suite of Classics and Ancient History UG modules.

What does the role entail?

As a Teaching Fellow in Ancient Greek History, your main duties will include:

- Teaching modules in Classics and Ancient History, including CLAS1300 Greek World and CLAS2680/CLAS3680 Greek Art and Society;
- Supervising and marking final-year UG dissertations in Classics and Ancient History;
- Preparing students for assessment tasks, by offering appropriate guidance; grading work once submitted and providing timely, constructive feedback in accordance with and with reference to published marking criteria;
- Working effectively as part of a team;
- Providing support and guidance to students, providing timely feedback, acting as a personal tutor, resolving issues and/or referring to specialist parties, where appropriate;
- Playing an active role in the university Open Days and in forward-facing initiatives organised by Classics (impact, public engagement) and the wider School;
- Contributing effectively to the administrative processes of the School as appropriate.

These duties provide a framework for the role and should not be regarded as a definitive list. Other reasonable duties may be required as consistent with the grade of the post.



What will you bring to the role?

As a Teaching Fellow in Ancient Greek History, you will have:

- A PhD in Ancient History or a cognate discipline, completed or within 6 months of completion;
- An ability to teach Greek and/or Latin language from beginner level;
- Experience of high-quality teaching on degree programmes in a university environment, including integrating digital technologies with teaching, managing and developing online environments;
- An enthusiastic and innovative approach to delivering inspirational teaching in Ancient History and the ability to interact with students in ways that will enhance the student experience;
- Excellent written and verbal communication skills, including presentation skills;
- A proven ability to set priorities in your academic and professional activities, to work effectively without close supervision, and to assume responsibility for teaching and administration, such as personal tutoring and marking;
- Good time management and planning skills, with the ability to meet tight deadlines and work effectively under pressure
- Ability to collaborate with colleagues in the delivery of language and culture teaching
